WELCOME TO SCOTT CAMPUS HOUSING

WHAT'S INCLUDED?

Private Carpeted Bedrooms

Each bedroom includes an extra long twin mattress, adjustable bed frame, desk, chair, dresser, and closet.

Bathrooms*

Scott Court, Scott Village, and Scott Crossing Suite Style include 2 or 1 full bathrooms in each apartment. Scott Crossing Traditional Style suites include 1 full bathroom.

Furnished Living Room

Each living room includes a couch, coffee table, chair, and table with four chairs or breakfast bar with stools.

Full Kitchen

Each kitchen includes a sink, dishwasher, oven, refrigerator, and microwave.

Laundry*

Laundry rooms are conveniently located throughout each property. Please remember to remove your clothes immediately after washing and drying for the courtesy of others. The cost for laundry is \$1.50 per load separately for washing and drying. MavCard or coin payments accepted.

Utilities

All apartments include water, sewer, trash, gas, electric, high-speed internet with wireless internet access.

Computer Lab and Rec Room*

Scott Village includes a centralized commons building with a study lounge with computers and printer, and a rec room with a pool table, Foosball table and TV. Scott Court includes a media room with computers, a TV and a printer, and a fitness room within each building. Scott Crossing has a media room, fitness center, a common area kitchen, and lounges with computers and TVs.

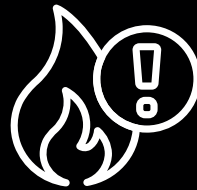

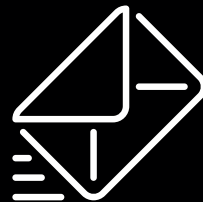

BIKE LOCKS

WHAT ABOUT PARKING?

Please park in the area designated to your residence hall. Scott Court and Scott Village residents may park inside the Scott Resident Lot Gates in Lot 10, 11, 12, and 13. Scott Crossing residents may park in the Pacific Street Garage. Residents hoping to use these lots must purchase a UNO parking permit. Permits can be purchased online at parking.unomaha.edu. Contact UNO Parking at 402.554.PARK (7275) if you have any questions.

CAN I BRING MY BIKE?

Yes! We encourage you to bring a bike. You can lock up your bike on the bike racks outside of your residence hall. We recommend using the "U" shaped lock to discourage theft. Bikes are not allowed to be stored in your rooms, on patios or in hallways.

CAN I HANG ITEMS ON THE WALLS?

Yes, as long as you use small nails or push pins.

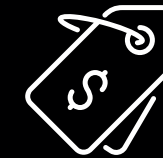

YOUR GUIDE TO LIVING WITH ROOMMATES

DISCUSS COMMON ISSUES

Guests

Unannounced, too frequent, disrespectful behavior, or overnight stays.

Noise Levels

Volume levels of music, TV or loud guests.

Food & Toiletries

Sharing, purchasing, or cooking.

Common Cleaning

Sharing supplies, definitions of clean, taking out the trash, washing dishes, or clutter.

Policy Violations

Roommate(s) violating policies within the apartment.

Temperature In Apartment

Deciding on a temperature range that works for everyone.

IT'S OK TO COMPROMISE

Remember that four roommates mean four ways of living. Be prepared to adjust your expectations according to your roommates and vice-versa. For example, if you think the trash should be taken out twice a week, but your roommates think once every two weeks is okay, a good compromise could be to take out the trash once a week. Willingness to compromise will make living with roommates more enjoyable.

SHOW RESPECT

No matter the differences between roommates, you must respect one another. Keep in mind that different does not mean bad. In fact, living with roommates from various backgrounds is a great opportunity to learn about different lifestyles, opinions, and cultures. If you're committed to respecting those around you, you can live harmoniously with anyone.

BE RESPONSIBLE

Remember to take responsibility for your own space. You and your roommates have to be comfortable with everything that goes on in the apartment. At the beginning of the year, your RA will help you complete a Roommate Agreement Form with all of your roommates. This is a required step to live in University Housing and will help start the conversation among roommates about personal living preferences and how to best use the space.

COMMUNICATION IS KEY

For a successful and healthy roommate relationship, the lines of communication must be open. You can't expect your roommates to read your mind, so be clear about your expectations, feelings, and differences.



KNOW THE RULES

You have a unique opportunity to live in a community with other students. To ensure that this is a positive experience for everyone, make yourself familiar with our policies & procedures handbook. You can find this at **housing.unomaha.edu**.



ROOMMATE TIP

You and your roommate(s) will be different. Keep a positive attitude and an open mind.



ROOMMATE TIP

Talk face-to-face with your roommates whenever possible. Leaving notes or sending texts or emails is not as effective.



ADDRESSING AN ISSUE

Conflicts are almost inevitable when four individuals share one space. Addressing them properly will help resolve issues and ideally prevent future occurrences. Below are steps for addressing issues with your roommate(s).

COMMUNICATE YOUR EXPECTATIONS

A roommate can't change a behavior if they don't know that there is a concern. It's your responsibility to talk face-to-face with your roommate(s). Let them know what the concern is and try to reach a common understanding or compromise.

TALK TO YOUR RESIDENT ASSISTANT

If you've discussed the issue with your roommate(s) but the issue continues, you should let your RA know. Staff members are trained to help you resolve conflicts by assisting in a mediated conversation. Mediation offers roommates a safe space to discuss any issues. Your RA will help you and your roommates come to a solution and create a plan of action. If necessary, your RA may get an RD or Prostaff involved to help mediate the situation.

SOMETIMES YOU NEED A LITTLE SPACE

If all of your attempts at resolving roommate issues have been unsuccessful, you can request a new room. Keep in mind that you can't request that a roommate be moved from your current apartment. New room requests can only be processed if a different room is available and has been approved by the HRL staff. This is a last resort for roommates in conflict. If approved the room transfer fee is \$50.00.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF PUBLIC SAFETY

- Protect life and property
- Provide building and exterior patrol
- Investigate criminal offenses
- Control the University Access System
- Provide emergency first-aid response for on-campus incidents

TEXT MESSAGE ALERTS

UNO has an emergency alert messaging system to provide timely warning for critical situations that may affect the university community. Messages are delivered in a variety of ways from overhead pages, PC alerts, email, social media alerts, and text messages. UNO uses text messaging to reach students wherever they are when alerts are sent. This is a free service which UNO students are automatically enrolled in, but have the option to opt out of.

BIAS ASSESSMENT AND RESPONSE TEAM

UNO's Bias Assessment and Response Team (BART) gathers information about non-emergency bias incidents and supports those who have become or witnessed someone become a target of an act of bias. It is also BART's goal to increase opportunities for communication and restorative justice for students, staff, and faculty.

UNO CARE TEAM

UNO's Care Team is a network of existing resources that works to assist students who are experiencing challenging situations or are needing additional support and resources. The Care Team also works on prevention and early intervention efforts for campus situations, which sometimes involve students experiencing distress or engaging in harmful or disruptive behaviors. The Care Team develops intervention and support strategies, offers case coordination, regularly reviews incidents, and recommends actions that address the situation. The UNO Care Team exists to make sure that students are not only safe but also thriving on campus.

SPEAK UP

We want every student to feel valued and respected. Your experience as a member of the university community matters to us. As a student, you have many resources to report and share your concerns. Our Residence Life Staff members are trained to help support and connect residents to the appropriate resources. If you have experienced or believe you have experienced discrimination, harassment, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and/or sexual violence, you have resources and reporting options.



DO'S AND DON'TS OF SAFETY

HERE'S WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

- Keep your doors locked.
- Keep your MavCARD with you at all times.
- Keep your key with you at all times. Replacements cost \$50 per key.
- Keep an inventory of your possessions and store them in a safe place.
- Purchase renters insurance in case of an emergency or theft. The university is unable to reimburse you for the loss of personal items.

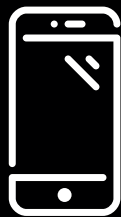

DO'S AND DON'TS OF SAFETY

HERE'S WHAT YOU SHOULD AVOID DOING:

- Propping building doors open or opening doors for anyone without a key or access card for that building.
- Opening your door for unknown individuals unless they are university staff. Call Public Safety if the individual makes you uncomfortable.
- Hide your keys under floor mats, over doors, or in other hiding places.
- Enter your apartment if you suspect that it has been entered illegally. Call Public Safety right away.

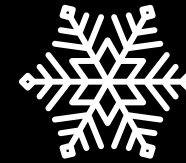


U-TIP FOR ANONYMOUS TEXT MESSAGING

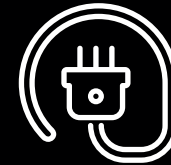


EMERGENCY PROCEDURES



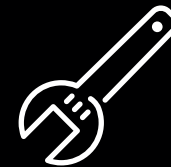
Winter Weather

Check the UNO website for any specific information about classes being canceled. You will also receive a UNO text alert in the case of classes being canceled.



Power Outage

If you experienced a power outage, call the front desk or 402.778.6211 for 24 hour help.



Maintenance

Call 402.778.6211 if you experience any issues with a leaking sink, plumbing issues, or issues with your heating or A/C unit. Non-emergency maintenance requests can be reported as well, but will not be serviced until the next business day.



Natural Gas

If you smell natural gas, leave the apartment. Do not use a light switch, telephone, or cell phone. Immediately report the issue to housing staff.



Fire

You must exit your apartment and move a safe distance away from the building when a fire alarm is sounding in your building. Never hang anything on sprinkler heads. Lock your door, and take your keys and ID with you.



Tornado

All Scott Campus residents will be notified of a tornado warning via the Campus Wide Paging System speaker in every apartment. SV students should go to the lower level of the SV Clubhouse. SC/SX students should go to the tornado shelter located on the first floor of each building.



UNO Lockdown

In the event of a hostile or emergency situation on campus or in the surrounding community, the university may enact "Shelter in Place." In this situation, the Campus Wide Paging System would instruct all members of the campus community to stay in place. All residents and staff members should follow the directions given through the broadcast system.

BILLING

Access your bill via your MavLINK account or a parent / guardian may be set up as guest to view your account.

SCOTT HOUSING BILLING PROCESS

Please refer to your signed lease to view which payment option you have selected. If you have chosen to charge your bill to your student account, it will appear on your MavLINK account along with your tuition and fees. If you have chosen to pay the property directly please refer to the: “How to Make a Payment” section of your lease. For all other billing charges such as lockouts, damages, re-cores, you will be billed directly, and these charges will not appear on your MavLINK account. Unpaid bills are subject to late fees. If you are awarded scholarships or financial aid, these awards will appear on your MavLINK account. All scholarships and financial aid are first applied to your tuition and fees. Then, any remaining amount is applied to your housing bill (if applicable). These awards are dispersed once in the fall and once in the spring.

For questions related to charges or payments towards your housing on your centralized bill, please contact Scott Campus Housing at 402.778.6541.

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

Any student removed from campus housing for student conduct reasons will be held liable for the terms of their contract. Violating student conduct policies does not provide

students the ability to end their housing contract. Students looking to end their housing contract forfeit their \$200 deposit for the administrative cancellation fee.

NAVIGATING CAMPUS

PARKING PERMITS

A valid parking permit is required to park in housing lots and can be purchased online.* Residents with a vehicle must park in designated parking Monday-Thursday from 7 A.M. to 5 P.M. and Friday 7 A.M. to 2:30 P.M. Permit sales begin August 1st and can be purchased online through MavPark.

CAMPUS SHUTTLE

Shuttles connect all UNO Campuses, run every 7-10 minutes and operate when classes are in session. Plan accordingly if you need to take a shuttle to class. Maps of shuttle routes are available online at parking.unomaha.edu. Track the shuttles using the UNO Shuttle Tracker App or online at unomaha.ridesystems.net.

MavRIDE

Avoid the stress/cost of parking and use your MavCARD to ride all Metro bus routes free of charge. All active students have MavRIDE on their MavCARD.

Bicycling

UNO is a bike-friendly campus. Bike racks are conveniently placed in close proximity to every university building. A network of low-volume streets, streets with bicycle lanes, and major trails surround our university. Chain slip? No problem. There are bike fix-it stations on both Dodge and Scott Campus. The stations come equipped with virtually every tool you might need to make a repair, as well as a pump.

B-Cycle

This unique bike-sharing program allows those who pay the minimal fee to easily ride a B-Cycle bike from one station to another. UNO is home to several B-Cycle stations on both Dodge and Scott Campus.
